Full Bucket Brigade Delay

Analog Delay Simulation

Version 2.0

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Introduction

The Full Bucket Brigade Delay is an effect plug-in for Microsoft Windows (VST2/VST3) and Apple macOS (VST2/VST3/AU) simulating the functionality and sound of classic analog delays. It is written in native C++ code for high performance and extremely low CPU consumption. The main features are:

- Authentic simulation of a bucket brigade device (BBD) delay line
- No "crackling" or "dropouts" when changing the delay time
- LFO modulation for Flanger, Chorus, or other modulation effects
- Sync-to-Host option
- Freeze mode
- Stereo!
- Quality control to send your hi-fi signals to hell
- Double precision audio processing
- Plug-in supports Windows and macOS (32 bit and 64 bit)

Full Bucket Brigade Delay is based on the new **iPlug2** framework maintained by **Oli Larkin and the iPlug2 team**. Big thanks, guys!!! Without your work it would not have been possible to create a resizable user interface.

To resize the plug-in you just grab the yellow triangle at the bottom right of the window and drag it. You can save the current window size using the entry "Save Window Size" in the context menu that opens when you right-click somewhere.

If you have trouble with the standard version of *Full Bucket Brigade Delay*, please grab the (sound-wise identical) "N" version of the plug-in which is based on the original **iPlug** framework.

Gosh, Why Another Delay Plug-In?

The Full Bucket Brigade Delay is an offspring of the tiny delay within my Nabla synthesizer. Just for fun I separated it into its own C++ project, added a few things like the LFO and the Quality control, always trying to achieve the functionality and sound of those old BBD units that I love so much. Now I sat here with a new plug-in. And decided to share it.

What's New With Version 2.0?

Version 2 of Full Bucket Brigade Delay adds two new parameters:

Delay Sync To Host

When activated the delay time will be synchronized to the host's tempo clock. Note that the delay time range switch will be deactivated then.


LFO Sync To Host

When activated the LFO speed will be synchronized to the host's tempo clock.

Furthermore I added another delay time range (250–2000ms). Thus the maximum delay time is now 2 seconds.

What Is a Bucket Brigade Device?

In a bucket brigade device, the incoming audio signal is sampled at a specific frequency, the *clock rate* (typically some kHz), and fed into the first of a line of subsequent bins or "buckets" (see figure below). At the same time, the original content of the first bucket is put into the second bucket while the original content of the second bucket is put in to the third bucket while... you got the story. The content of the last bucket is sent to the output of the device. It may additionally be attenuated and sent back to the input – this is called *Regeneration* or *Feedback*. Since the whole process is repeated with every clock cycle, it takes some time until the original input sample appears at the output of the device; the signal is delayed.

Now it is some kind of obvious (*cough, cough*) that the clock rate determines how fast the samples are moving through the BBD and thus how long the delay time is. This has three immediate consequences:

- Higher clock rates result in shorter delay times and lower clock rates in longer delay times.
- No matter how high the clock rate, there is always some delay between input and output of the BBD – because the samples always have to travel through all the buckets.
- If the clock rate is *varied*, the samples that are already "in" the BBD will appear at a different rate at the output than they had been sampled at the input. Thus their "frequency" will *change*.

(Feel free to check the Full Bucket Brigade Delay if it is really working this way!)

Wait a minute: Sampling is used here? Why is a BBD delay line then called "analog"? Because the "samples" are not digitized but handled "as is": They are "measurements" of a continuous signal, discrete in time but still continuous with respect to their values (well, almost...), and as such they travel through the BBD.

Of course this will have other side effects: Since buckets of a BBD are not perfect analog memory elements, the signal quality will degrade with the length of the BBD and the clock rate. Typically, the frequency range of the delayed signal is smaller than the one of the original signal; even more, the delayed signal may be slightly distorted. In the past this was considered to be a major problem, today we call it "analog" and love it for the resulting "warm" sound!

User Interface

The layout of the *Full Bucket Brigade Delay's* user interface is straight forward: In the "DELAY" section you can select the delay time range (1–8ms, 4–31ms, 16–125ms, 31–500ms, 250–2000ms), set the delay time itself, and adjust the feedback level. Note that changing the delay time will change the frequency of whatever signal is already "in" the delay line.

The "LFO" section controls the speed (up to 25Hz) and the depth of the low frequency oscillator modulating the delay time. Here lies the origin of all those nice effects named *Flanger*, *Chorus*, *LSD Trip Echo*, *Psychotic Slapback* etc.

The mix between original and effect is set in the "OUTPUT" section along with the "quality" of the delayed signal: The lower the value of the *Quality* parameter, the higher the analogishness of the effect.

Have fun with the *Freeze* mode: Click on the "FREEZE" button, and whatever is currently in the delay line will be looped forever until you click the button again. Note that in "Freeze" mode the input is "locked" i.e. the input signal will not be added to the delay line.

Finally, you can select one of the ten presets by clicking on the yellow triangle at the top left corner of the effect screen. These presets give you some examples of what you can do with the *Full Bucket Brigade Delay*.

Tip: If you want to know what I remember best of those old BBDs then turn *Feedback* to maximum (100%) and *Quality* to some low value (\sim 30%) and twiddle the *Time* parameter. And better reduce the volume of your amp.

MIDI Learn

All parameters of the *Full Bucket Brigade Delay* can be controlled by MIDI controllers, or more precise: Each MIDI controller can control one of *Full Bucket Brigade Delay*'s parameters.

Assigning MIDI controllers to *Full Bucket Brigade Delay* parameters is done via the MIDI Learn function. To activate *MIDI Learn*, click on the "LEARN" button and wiggle both the MIDI controller and the *Full Bucket Brigade Delay*'s parameter that you want to link. If you want to unlearn the assignment, right-click the "LEARN" button (the label now reads "UNLEARN") and activate it. Now wiggle the MIDI controller or the parameter that you want to unlearn.

Parameters

parameter	ID	description
Range	0	Coarse range of the delay time: 1–8ms, 4–31ms, 16–125ms, or 31–500ms
Time	1	Delay time with respect to the delay time range
Feedback	2	Amount of feedback
Speed	3	LFO speed (0 to 25 Hz)
Depth	4	Depth of delay time modulation by LFO
Mix	5	Mix between original and effect signal
Quality	6	Quality of the simulated BBD delay line
Delay Sync	7	Sync delay time to the host's tempo clock
LFO Sync	8	Sync LFO speed to the host's tempo clock

Frequently Asked Questions

How do I install the Full Bucket Brigade Delay (Windows VST2 32 bit version)?

Just copy the file fbdelay.dll from the ZIP archive you have downloaded to your system's or favorite DAW's VST2 plug-in folder. Your DAW should automatically register the *Full Bucket Brigade Delay* VST2 plug-in the next time you start it.

How do I install the Full Bucket Brigade Delay (Windows VST2 64 bit version)?

Just copy the file fbdelay64.dll from the ZIP archive you have downloaded to your system's or favorite DAW's VST2 plug-in folder. Your DAW should automatically register the *Full Bucket Brigade Delay* VST2 plug-in the next time you start it.

Note: You may have to remove any existing (32 bit) fbdelay.dll from your VST2 plug-in folder or else your DAW may screw the versions up...

How do I install Full Bucket Brigade Delay (Windows VST3 64 bit version)?

Just copy the files fbdelay64.vst3 from the ZIP archive you have downloaded to your system's or favorite DAW's VST3 plug-in folder. Your DAW should automatically register the *Full Bucket Brigade Delay* VST3 plug-in the next time you start it.

How do I install Full Bucket Brigade Delay (Mac VST2/VST3/AU 64 bit)?

Locate the downloaded PKG package file fbdelay_2_0_0_mac.pkg in Finder (!) and do a right- or control-click on it. In the context menu, click on "Open". You will be asked if you really want to install the package because it comes from an "unidentified developer" (me ©). Click "OK" and follow the installation instructions.

What is the plug-in ID of the Full Bucket Brigade Delay?

The ID is fbbd.

No Sync-to-Host Tempo Possible? This Sucks!
